

Good Bramcote College Ofsted Inspection

Firstly, welcome back to the summer term – I trust that you had a good Easter break and that your children are returning to school relaxed and ready for another busy term. I would like to wish the best of luck to all of our pupils who have tests and exams this term. I know how hard they have worked and will continue to work over the next few weeks, and we are looking forward to another year of excellent outcomes across the Trust.

At the end of February, Bramcote College was inspected by Ofsted. It was the fourth of our Trust schools to be inspected over the last year, and the first inspection of the school since 2017. I am delighted to report that the school was judged by inspectors to be Good in all areas, maintaining our position of all schools in the Trust being judged as Good. The report has been made available to all parents and will be on the Ofsted website next week.

Behind the headline measures, the messages within the report are particularly pleasing. Inspectors recognised the high aspirations for all pupils at the College, and the way that the school lives up to its motto of 'Work hard, Be well, Do well'. The curriculum is described as broad, ambitious and wellplanned, and it helps pupils to achieve well.

Inspectors reported that pupils are happy and appreciate the opportunities that the school gives them. The excellent pastoral support of the school is recognised. The team found that pupils trust staff to keep them safe and know who they can turn to if they need help or guidance. Pupils are described as 'well prepared for their next stages in education and beyond. They benefit from excellent and personalised advice about their future choices.'

Pupils' behaviour is singled out for particular praise. Classrooms are described as calm and orderly, and pupils as polite and respectful. The quality of provision in the sixth-form is also praised and the report says that sixth-form students are 'very well supported to achieve their ambitions.'

Inspectors recognise that the school has received valuable support from the multi-academy trust and that the governing body and trustees know the school well and provide effective challenge to leaders. It celebrates the fact that staff are proud to work in the school.

As you would expect, it identifies the next areas that we should focus on as the school goes from strength to strength. These include ensuring that as many pupils as possible access the extra-curricular opportunities on offer, and building consistency so that the quality of every lesson meets the highest standards. The school is not complacent, and continues to work on improvements, as do all of our

I would like to offer my sincere congratulations to Mrs Gale and all of the team for achieving this excellent outcome – our schools are not defined by Ofsted, and all the work we do is aimed at improving the life chances of pupils, not aiming for an Ofsted grade. However, it is very gratifying when the progress that the school is recognised, especially when it is so well-deserved.

NFL Flag Tournament

On Tuesday, 10 year 8s were selected to travel to the university of Nottingham sports complex. With the help of team captain Josh, there were 3 girls and 7 boys picked to go to Alderman White's first ever NFL Flag tournament. After a great first training session on Monday after school with the help of the experienced year 11 Benny to coach the team, we felt ready with a few plays and ideas going into the day.

We started the day playing a friendly game against an all girls year 9 team from Arnold Hill. They had similar lack of experience to ourselves but coached by a seasoned American Football coach. The game was of a really good quality considering the lack of experience and training both teams had. Both teams were able to put together plays and look the real deal.

Captain and Quarterback Josh had spent some time putting plays together on paper to tell the offence team and

show them what we need to do. The 10 had even managed to nicely split themselves into a starting 5 for both offence and defence. Arnold scored first after starting with the offence, earning them the first 6 points of the game, however, in going for the 1 point extra, Ben nicely intercepted to give ourselves the 1 point. Arnold winning 6-1.

As we switched to our first attempt with the ball and the 5 on the offence team came on the pitch, we scored our first touchdown with running back Ruby picking the ball up and proving too quick for anyone to get near her. We opted for the extra 2 points but didn't make it. We managed to defend the next offence well with team defence doing their job, then next attack Luigi caught the ball well to score our second touchdown. A good pass saw Arnold score another to make the scores 13-12 to Alderman White. We managed to defend the



pressure really well from Arnold, not to mention 4 fantastic tags in a row from Aoife to keep us in the lead at half time.

A really impressive first half for our first ever competitive game saw us look to build in the second half. Shortly after this, we took part in a 40 yard dash, just like in the NFL combine, set up by a university student doing their PHD studies with the proper equipment to record our times very precisely.

Everyone had a few goes with some slower than others, but all in the team managed to get under 6.5 seconds, with most under 6 seconds. However, the fastest of the day were awarded to Ruby with an impressive 5.68 seconds and Nathan with a 5.519 seconds. We got to witness another student at the uni perform a 4.9! Just before lunch, we managed to play another short game in

which we were looking even stronger and won 12-0 with touchdowns coming from Ruby and Beeson.

We had a break for lunch and then had time to work on our own plays and practice new ones against ourselves. We worked on offence v defence to give ourselves a real go. Everyone worked really hard and enjoyed the day at the fantastic facilities at the uni. Thankfully the weather remained sunny all day too!

The new AW NFL Flag team have now qualified and earned themselves a spot in the next stage of the competition on the road to Los Angeles to represent England in the Flag Football world. We will be travelling to Leicester in June to play at the regional tournament to try and win our way to the next stage again.


coaches around the club were all impressed with the effort from the boys and so they should be.
