Alderman White rules on mobile phones

- Cannot be used, seen or heard at school at all during the school day (unless with adult permission for a specific use)
- Will be confiscated if the rule is broken handed back after a reflection at the end of the day
- 2 incidents in a term or inappropriate use = not allowed in school at all
- Failure to hand the phone to an adult will be dealt with as defiance
- Brought at own risk
- They are a safeguarding risk and create a potential behaviour issue
- We strongly advise phones are left at home



We teach students to use IT well

- We encourage appropriate IT use
- All students have a Chromebook on our managed system
- We can filter and block, and monitor use for any issues
- We control the apps that students can access







Smart phone risks

- Age inappropriate content
- Grooming
- Inappropriate use of social media causing friendship or bullying issues at school
- Social media addiction
- Impact on concentration span
- Misinformation, disinformation and extremist views
- Unknown effects on developing brains


















Do you need to be in touch with your child during the school day?



- Did you do that in primary school?
- If your child is unwell or there has been an issue, we will contact you
- Students can go to the Base or Reception and ask staff to contact home
- Students contacting parents if they are unhappy with something at school doesn't help students or parents frustrating and upsetting for parents; stops students from developing resilience and exposes them to other smartphone risks; creates a barrier between home and school.
- Please try to build trust with adults in school

- Access given to persons with parental responsibility who provide an email address.
- If you already have a child at the school, your latest child will be linked to your existing account.
- Parents who are new to AW will be sent login instructions in due course.
- We will also require you to complete the parental consent section in MCAS





Chromebook scheme



- The expectation is that all students in school (Years 7-11) have access to a Chromebook or laptop device in school.
- We will have stock for every child in Year 7 or joining the school at a later stage.
- You can choose to either purchase a device, bring your own device or loan a device from us.
- We subsidise the cost of Chromebooks. £105 or £49 if you were entitled to free school meals in the last 6 years. (original Chromebook price £160, bag price £7).
- Chromebook comes with a carry case and charger.
- We offer flexible payment plans meaning you can pay small amounts over time.
- Chromebooks will not be distributed to Year 7 students until October
 2024
- Chromebooks will be available for purchase on the MyChildAtSchool platform

There have been numerous research studies which show the benefits of emotional support dogs in schools/colleges, and Willow is an integral part of our school community by supporting students experiencing mental health challenges. Willow is used to support students with counselling sessions, but students often see her around and about school too.





Home and School Working Together: The Home School Agreement



- The school will:
- Carry out our legal duties to safeguard students

- Respond within 2 working days to communication from parents/carers;
- Provide an annual report and Subject Consultation Evening and communicate any concerns to parents.



Home and School Working Together: The Home School Agreement



- Parents and Carers will:
- Support our school ethos and INSPIRE values;
- Treat staff, students and other parents with respect, both on and offline;
- Ensure that your child attends school regularly, on time and with the correct uniform and equipment;
- Notify the school of the reason for your child's absence;
- Make the school aware of any concerns or circumstances that may affect your child at school;
- Support the school's behaviour and uniform policy;
- Provide up to date contact details, permissions and read communications from school using the MyChildAtSchool (MCAS) platform;
- Encourage your child to read frequently and complete homework by the deadline and to a good standard;
- Encourage your child to take part in trips and enrichment activities;
- Sign and support the Chromebook use policy agreement;
- Attend Parents' Consultation Evenings and read Progress Reports.



Home and School Working Together: The Home School Agreement



- Students will:
- Support our school ethos and INSPIRE values;
- Treat everyone in our school community with respect, both on and offline;
- Respect the school environment and other people's belongings;
- Attend school regularly and punctually;
- Wear correct school uniform and bring the correct equipment to school;
- Use your Chromebook in line with school expectations, as well as other IT equipment;
- Do your best at all times;
- Present your work neatly and clearly in line with school expectations;
- Follow our Classroom Expectations and Chromebook Expectations;
- Do all homework and coursework by the required deadlines;
- Take responsibility for your own behaviour, be honest and be ready to say sorry if necessary.



Biometric Information System





- The school uses a biometric information system called Vericool for operating with the cashless catering service- used for both break and lunch purchases.
- A Biometric Information System is a secure way of a student accessing their individual account and reduces administration time and cost in dealing with lost or forgotten cards/passwords/PINs. It also removes the opportunity for anyone else to use the account.
- Free School Meals are anonymous as the daily allowance is simply automatically added to a student's account on the Cashless Catering Service and lunch is purchased in the usual way.
- It reduces the need for a student to carry around cash for break and lunchtime purchases as parents or carers can add money to an account via the online system.
- To use your child's biometric information, we require the written consent of at least one parent.
 Giving consent will allow your child's information to be used for accessing both the cashless catering service.



Checklist for parents/carers:



- Ensure that the key information form has been completed (link on slide 6).
- Check that we have your correct contact details.
- Look out for the key preferences form via email June.
- Read the behaviour policy so that you are clear about our expectations and protocols:
