General Election

The General Election campaign is now in full swing. The parties have selected their candidates and are now desperately seeking our votes. All the commentators agree that this election is very different from recent votes, from the time of year it's taking place to the fact that it is dominated by a single issue, to the unpredictable impact of new parties.



Although the vast majority of our students are too young to vote in the current system, it does not mean that the election is irrelevant to them. Their lives will undoubtedly be affected by the policies introduced by the next government, many of which may lead to radical changes in our country.

Our students are certainly interested in political issues, although they perhaps approach them in a different way than previous generations, focusing on issues, rather than party loyalty. I have had many conversations with students about current topics that arouse passionate interest, including climate change and the environment; the rights of women; gender identity; racism and religious prejudice; homelessness; support for mental health; international aid and disaster relief - they are very much aware of things taking place in the modern world. Sometimes that's because we have discussed it in school, but they will also be talking to you at home, and hearing about issues in the media and the wider world.

Our constituency of Broxtowe is a particularly fascinating one in this election. In the last election, it was one of the most marginal seats in the UK and since then, it has become even more unpredictable as our current MP is standing as part of The Independent Group for Change, alongside candidates from both Conservative and Labour parties, as well as a number of other candidates. We know that events in Broxtowe over the next few weeks will generate a lot of interest.

Given this interest and importance of the vote in December, I am delighted to let you know that on Monday 2nd December at 4pm, we will be hosting a General Election hustings event, particularly aimed at young people in the constituency. Bramcote College will be visited by Anna Soubry, standing in this election for The Independent Group for Change, Greg Marshall, standing as the Labour Party Candidate, Darren Henry for the Conservative Party, and Cat Boettge, for the Green Party. We will be inviting all of our 6th Form students and KS4 students from both schools, as well as 6th Form students from other local schools. During the evening, we will be hearing from each of the candidates and students will have the chance to pose some questions.

It is a great opportunity for our students to become involved in the local and national debate, and I am very grateful for the candidates who have been so willing to take part. We will make sure we share the highlights with you in a future newsletter.
