## **Gaming and Off-Rolling**

For most parents, Ofsted inspection reports are not at the forefront of their minds when choosing a school and their judgements about a school will be based much more on their own experience of the school than a report by inspectors. This is even more the case when it is a few years since the last inspection took place. Alderman White and Bramcote College were both inspected in Spring 2017, within a few weeks of each other. Both were judged Good, and we are confident that as a result of the progress both schools have made since then, we can expect at least the same judgement when we are next inspected.

You may be aware, especially if you work in the field of education, that at the start of the school year, Ofsted introduced a new framework to guide the way that they inspect schools. The framework is a statutory document which is updated regularly, normally every three years, and there are always new things for schools to absorb and respond to. The current framework probably represented the biggest change since Ofsted came into being. The headline changes included a greatly increased focus on curriculum, a lack of emphasis on raw student achievement data, and a focus on teacher workload. The changes in curriculum alone have encouraged a fundamental reappraisal of the purposes and structure of the curriculum in many schools.

Another change that has received a lot of attention is the focus in the new framework on the practices of 'gaming' and 'off-rolling'. Although it is a minority of schools that are guilty of these practices, when they occur, they can be damaging for students. Gaming is where students are entered for courses that are not in their educational best interests, in order to boost the school's league table results. For example, there have been occasions highlighted where all students in the school were entered for a qualification that is clearly targeted at a particular group, such as English as an additional language.

Off-rolling is defined by Ofsted as the practice of removing a pupil from the school roll where this is primarily in the interests of the school, not the pupil. There are a number of ways that this can happen, including encouraging a parent to remove their child, or using an alternative provider to register the child, thereby removing them from the school roll. This may be done to boost the school's results, or to avoid the expense and bureaucracy of an exclusion.

In our Trust, our philosophy is very clear. We strive at all times to maintain the highest ethical standards and always act in our students' best interests. Our schools serve the whole of their local community, and are inclusive and welcoming. We make sure that our curriculum is broad enough to serve the needs of all students and we have a continuum of provision available for students who find it more difficult to access mainstream classes all the time. I am very pleased that the new Ofsted framework has identified and challenged practices that are working against student interests. The vision for our schools is about so much more than chasing an inspection grade, and we will never do anything that is not in your children's interests in order to please Ofsted or gain an advantage in school league tables.

## **International Women's Day at Experian**

A group of Year 9 girls from Alderman White celebrated International Women's Day early on Thursday with a trip to Experian's base at Ruddington. The event was to celebrate the role of women alongside promoting STEM careers and finding out more about working at Experian.

The day started with an introduction by Gemma to Experian and the building with lots of facts and figures about what they do. A big feature of this was about the processing of and security of the data they hold as Ruddington is one of their big data centres. On the way in we noticed the big retractable barriers for entering and leaving the car park. We were told that these were 'tank proof' and that the walls were 'bomb proof', such is the value of the data they hold.

Our facilitators for the day then introduced themselves and told us about their career journeys and their roles within Experian. All the girls were encouraged to ask the facilitators questions during the day as well. This was followed by a quiz to see what they had taken in from the initial presentation! Well done to Rhinos, the winning team!

The rest of the morning was spent working with some fantastic kit - LEGO robots. Emily did a training session about the elements of the kit and how to programme the commands and the girls then had time to be creative and write a programme for their robot. Each team then demonstrated what their robot could do - the winning team was a robot who could do the 'Cha Cha Slide' with singing. Amazing! Thanks to the Derbyshire Education Business Partnership for lending Experian the kit.

After lunch the girls continued working in teams. The first task was completing a timeline of women in history during the last 120 years. I think some of the events really took them by surprise - they certainly had women being allowed on the floor of the stock exchange much earlier than 1973! The final team activity was designed to get the girls thinking more about some of the job roles within Experian. They had a card sort with job titles, explanations of job roles and photos of women who do those roles, most of whom they had met earlier in the day. I have to say this was a very hard task with a lot of discussion. I know I got myself in to trouble with one group by steering them in the wrong direction! However, the activity was more about getting the girls to think about those roles within Experian than getting the answers right (that's my defence and I'm sticking to it!!).

Our day concluded with a tour of the data halls tucked away behind metre thick walls. The girls were amazed by the value of the data Experian hold and the speed with which transactions happen. They were also impressed with the storage capacity which Cain, our guide, compared to iPads. We also saw the 'mainframe' which Ellie had heard of through watching spy movies! However, their favourite part of the tour was going in to the 'cold' area.


On returning to school there was a general consensus that they best part of the day had been working with the robots as it was fun to get 'hands on' and creative with technology.






