Welcome to the Summer Term

Firstly, welcome back to the new term. I hope that you are well. Although the Easter holiday was not like any that we can remember, we are still trying to maintain the rhythm of our school terms. Our focus this half term would very much be on preparing Year 11 and Year 13 students for the exam season, and obviously this term will be very different. However, we will still work very closely with all of the students to make sure they have an appropriate good-quality destination for next year, whether that is a university, an apprenticeship, a place at Bramcote College 6th Form or another provider, or another suitable education or training place.

For all other year groups, school continues, albeit in a very different format than the one we're used to. Teachers are working hard to make sure that the lessons they are planning for students are suitable to be completed at home and fit in well with the scheme of work. Whenever we do return to school, our intention is to make sure that we can pick up with as little interruption to learning as possible, so it is important that students are carrying out the lessons as diligently as they can, just as if they were attending school in person.

You may have seen news items about educational resources, including online lessons - for example those provided by BBC Bitesize, or Oak Academy. This is just a small selection of the huge volume of online resources for learning available websites with downloadable resources, youtube channels, social media learning groups and so on. Whilst they can offer some engaging and valuable materials, particularly if your child has a particular area of interest, we would encourage you to focus first of all on the materials provided by our schools, which have been chosen by the teachers who know your children and the place they are in their learning journey.

We do of course recognise that these are not normal times, and if there is any additional support that you need, please let us know. For example, if you are finding either that there is not enough to do, or that there is so much that it is difficult to manage, then we may be able to offer some advice or point you to some additional resources. If you are struggling with access to technology or learning resources, we may be able to help, and in particular if you or your children are feeling overwhelmed or unable to cope, then please contact us and we will do what we can.

Finally, we are also conscious that there is much media speculation about the date for a potential re-opening of schools. Our position is clear – we want our schools to be open for students, and for normal life to be resumed, just as soon as it is safe to do so for students, staff and the wider community. We will follow guidance but our first priority is the safety and wellbeing of our school community. In the meantime, we will do everything we can to make sure that learning continues and that we are well-planned for every eventuality,

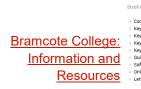

Doing our bit to support the NHS and Care Workers

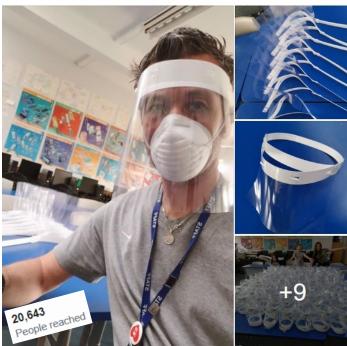

Individual Careers Support during Lockdown

The schools may be closed, but we are still offering careers support to students. Luckily most of the individual meetings for Year 11s with a qualified careers advisor had already taken place before the schools closed. There was a bit of follow up work required and a few students were on the list to have a face to face meeting.

Fortunately I had run apprenticeships workshops with Year 13 a couple of weeks earlier but had not seen the Year 11s interested in apprenticeships as it was still a little early for vacancies that they could apply for appearing. Following the school closure, all Year 11s interested in the apprenticeship route have been sent a set of resources and support materials which will put them in a really good position for making successful applications once they have worked through them.

The Year 13s interested in the apprenticeship route are currently brushing up their CVs and working through the support materials. They will be submitting their CVs prior to individual remote meetings with our careers advisors from ideas4careers, Katherine and Zoe. They have been asked to think beforehand exactly what they would like support with so that these meetings can be as productive as possible for them.

We have also set up a specific email address for individual queries, monitored and responded to by relevant staff. (careershelp@whptrust.org). If Year 11 or Year 13 students have individual careers concerns they should be encouraged to seek support by using this email address. We may not be in school but we are still here to support our students.

Books Online

Every day, our students in years 7-10 read for 15 minutes after lunch. They should also be reading for 20 minutes in the evening. This is a great habit, and one that will help your children despite the school closure.

With libraries shut, it is more difficult to find books that your child will enjoy. Fortunately, many organisations have made books available online and free of charge:

For students reading at gold, silver and blue levels, free online books are available at: readon.myon.co.uk

For students who need more challenge, classic texts of British and American Literature are free to read or listen to online from the **US Library of Congress** at: read.gov/books

For students with younger children at home, the **BookTrust** has a daily updated website with a range of reading-based activities that your teenager can use to help you entertain the younger children — it's worth a try! booktrust.org.uk



Amazon are offering 3 months' free trial of **Audible** – their audio book company, but be aware that if you do not cancel, they will charge £7.99 per month after the initial offer ends.

For all students, keeping going with creative writing is really important – as well as being worth 25% of their English Language GCSE, **creative writing** supports students' mental well-being and encourages mindful escapes into other worlds. It will also help students to practise their handwriting, ready for when we no longer have to stay at home. pobble365.com has a new picture -based stimulus every day and easy-to-follow activities that also support grammar and technical accuracy skills.

Accelerated Reader: Students can quiz on their reading via the school websites – Resources – Accelerated Reader. They will see the familiar log-in screen, and must use their school username. The password is their library-specific one. They type in the title of the book they have read in the usual way, and off they go!
